Proposed levy on big rigs could add \$500 to yearly grocery bills

State lawmakers were told Wednesday that a proposed heavy truck tax is going to add almost \$500 to the annual grocery bills for many Connecticut families.

Gov. Ned Lamont is anticipating raising \$90 million annually from taxing trucks weighing more than 26,000

user tax was a focus of a legislative hearing Wednesday on the nearly \$3.4 billion revenue package supporting the two-year, \$46 billion budget plan that Lamont presented to the legislature in February.

The Lamont administration is estimating the truck tax will allow for capital investments of \$1 billion over the next five years for funding needed safety, traffic congestion and modernization proj-

Plaintiffs: State erred on trooper's DUI risk

Amended suit faults McDonald oversight

WATERBURY — An amended civil suit filed Tuesday against the state of Connecticut claims state police failed to act on a foreseeable risk before state police Sgt. John McDonald allegedly drove drunk and crashed Sept. 25, 2019, injuring a mother and daughter from Middlebury.

"They failed to take appropriate steps to investigate and remove its agents, servants and/or employees when it learned of their inability to carry out the duties of their employment," the amended

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
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House panel backs rail plan to boost Waterbury branch

HARTFORD — State legislators on the Transportation Committee voted unanimously Wednesday to advance legislation proposing to increase the number and frequency of trains running on the Waterbury branch of Metro-North Railroad.

Roland J. Lemar, D-New Haven, the legislative panel's House chairman, observed Lamont was at the Waterbury train station highlighting his proposal to expand service on the commuter rail line as he recognized members of the bipartisan Waterbury Rail Line Caucus for their advoca-

"There have been so many people who have been focused on this investment for a number of years, and the good news is while we are having this meeting, the governor is announcing that he is fully supportive of this investment," he said.

Lamont proposed funding of \$1.2 million in his twoyear, \$46 billion budget plan to increase the number of trains servicing the Waterbury line of Metro-North from 15 to 22 cars, starting in the 2023 fiscal year.

The legislation that the Committee Transportation approved Wednesday directs the state Department of Transportation to increase the number and frequency of trains running on the Waterbury line, as well as adding stops in Seymour, Derby and Shelton.

Senate Minority Leader Kevin C. Kelly, R-Stratford, and Sen. Eric C. Berthel, R-Watertown, sponsored Senate Bill 576. It does not specify how many more trains and train runs should be added, or propose funding for the expansion.

There are two other House bills that also propose expansions of the Waterbury line.

More than two dozen legislators from Naugatuck Valley towns and neighboring communities are cosponsoring House Bill 5839 that would authorize \$6 million in state bonding to finance operational growth of the Waterbury line. Rep. Kara Rochelle, D-Ansonia, introduced House Bill 6077 that proposes to expand the number and frequency of trains like Senate Bill 576 without specifying any appropriations.

Both House bills were referred to the Finance, Revenue and Bonding Committee on Jan. 28. There has been no action on either proposal yet.

per day, "a critical link to lower Fairfield County and Manhattan."

He said more people are leaving New York City and moving to Waterbury and the Naugatuck Valley region largely because of their proximity to passenger rail.

"In talking with the Realtors, one of the main reasons people from New York City are coming to Waterbury is affordability, good schools and access to rail," O'Leary

Lamont reaffirmed his commitment to the Waterbury branch during a news conference in the Waterbury Train Station parking lot

Wednesday afternoon. "We've discovered over this last year, as miserable as it may have been, that a lot of people realize Connecticut's an amazing place..." Lamont said. "But we've got to make it easier for you to get to and from. Maybe you don't have to be in New York City or Stamford every day, but we want you to be able to get there easier once or twice a week.'

State Sen. Joan V. Hartley, D-15th District, said the increase in service is possible due to a \$116 million upgrade that involves signalizing the Waterbury branch, which is set to be completed by April. Three passing sidings have been built on the single-track railroad.

The line has also been outfitted with signals, which direct traffic and prevent collisions, and Positive Train Control, a system that automatically enforces safety rules, such as speed limits, if the engineer fails to act.

"What we're talking about here is something simple: two-way train service," Hartley said. "Hello! You can go north and you can go south. And yes, effectively that doubles our capacity."

While bidirectional train travel isn't a novel idea, Jim Gildea, chairman of the Connecticut Commuter Rail Council, said the new trains will provide more opportunities for people to go to work and school, and to visit places.

"I think I have real credibility when I tell you how exciting this is and how amazing this is," said the Derby resident, who has been using the Waterbury branch to commute to work

for the last 10 years. "For the Waterbury branch commuter, this is what we've dreamed about and thought about. To be able to have seven more trains a day is a game changer."

The Route 8 corridor between Waterbury Bridgeport has a growing population of about 250,000 people. The state Department of Transportation has no plans of expanding the capacity of Route 8 any time soon.

"The only other transportation corridor we're talking about is not a state highway along this route, it's Route 8, and Route 8 is lovely, it's scenic, it's curvy, it's certainly never going to be an intersection," Hartley said.



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
